O Come, O come Emmanuel

Choosing hymns that correspond to the scripture, the season or a holiday has become part of my Monday schedule since June (I had the help of Diane McDowell when I first joined you.)

The study of hymns and their texts has always engaged me, the message of the words speaks to me first. In the season of Advent we are preparing, looking towards the future, coming to

our homes to light a lamp in the early dark. The specific music for this type of season is sometimes somber, sometimes alive with exuberant expectancy. It is not yet the birthday of a King,

but rather, how can we each individually prepare. I begin my second Advent with you, and hope to share in the newsletter some of the ways that music has traditionally and globally honored God and all creation.

Eleanor Farjeon (1881 - 1965) was an award-winning English author of primarily children's literature. She was friends with many leading authors of her time, including D.H. Lawrence and Robert Frost.

Though Eleanor produced a tremendous amount of work--more than eighty books of children's stories and poems, adult novels, and other work, plus numerous school plays--

her best known creations are the poem, "Morning Has Broken," made popular in the song by Cat Stevens, and this poem, "People Look East,"

which someone paired up with an old French melody to create a Christmas carol that first appeared in 1928. Our choir offers this lovely pairing of text and melody for December 1st.

People, look east. The time is near
Of the crowning of the year.
Make your house fair as you are able,
Trim the hearth and set the table.
People, look east and sing today:
Love, the guest, is on the way.

Furrows, be glad. Though earth is bare,
One more seed is planted there:
Give up your strength the seed to nourish,
That in course the flower may flourish.
People, look east and sing today:
Love, the rose, is on the way.

Birds, though you long have ceased to build, Guard the nest that must be filled.

Even the hour when wings are frozen
God for fledging time has chosen.

People, look east and sing today:

Love, the bird, is on the way.

Stars, keep the watch. When night is dim
One more light the bowl shall brim,
Shining beyond the frosty weather,
Bright as sun and moon together.

<u>Ushers</u> - You can never have too many ushers, right? Or is it not enough ushers? It seems like it might be another small, unnoticed, thankless kind of job in the church, but it isn't. It might be one of the more important Sunday morning worship leadership roles in our church. Greeters and ushers are frequently among the first to be noticed when guests enter for worship. "You never get a 2nd chance to make a first impression." The usher is a font of information on the church and the service. Many times the usher is the first person someone will ask a question - "Where is ?" You fill in the blank. The ushers alone can make a guest feel welcomed or ignored and unwelcome. Adopt A Family for Christmas

As we have done in the past, we are asking church members to adopt a family from Head Start for Christmas. Head Start has several families that would like to be included in our program this year. If you decide to adopt a family, you need to buy gifts for each of the children in that family. Head Start sent a form home asking the family to provide gift ideas for the children. That form is in an envelope on the board in the front lobby. If you select one of the families, remove the form from the envelope and write your name on the envelope so we know who is adopting the family. When you buy items for a family with more than one child, please put the child's first name on the item. Do not wrap the gifts, but you can provide wrapping paper. Put all the items together in bags - garbage bags work - and label the bags with the identification number of the family you have. The families are identified as Family 1, Family 2, etc. The deadline for turning in the gifts is Monday, December 16.




Poinsettias For Christmas
